

Suggestions To Victory Gardeners

Victory gardeners are likely to have success with their tomatoes, cabbage, lettuce, peppers and other transplants if they use a "starter" or "booster" solution when transplanting, according to Asst. County Agent Al Geiss, chairman of the County Victory Garden Planning committee.

This "starter" solution, which is plain words is just liquid fertilizer, is made by mixing one tablespoonful of victory garden fertilizer in one gallon of water. Plants may be killed or injured by using a stronger mixture. The solution of one tablespoonful of fertilizer to a gallon of water is both effective and safe if the solution is kept well mixed up during application.

Plants given a "starter" solution usually will start growing immediately without an apparent setback from transplanting. This is especially valuable for tomato plants. About a pint of the liquid fertilizer poured around each plant when it is set out in the garden is recommended. The treatments may be repeated in ten days with good results if the solution is not made stronger than recommended.

These liquid fertilizers are valuable in the home garden all through the season also for keeping leafy plants such as lettuce, cabbage and chard growing. Row plants may be fertilized every ten days or so by pouring a gallon at the juncture of the plant with the soil for each six or eight feet of row. Following are suggestions for handling transplants:

1. Disturb roots as little as possible and keep all roots attached. Never pull or tear the plants loose. Use a trowel and lift out carefully.
2. Water the plants a few hours before removing them for transplanting.
3. Do not allow plants to dry out after removal.
4. Transplant in cool, cloudy weather or in the afternoon if possible.
5. Set each plant slightly deeper than before in a hole large enough to take the roots without cramping or bunching. Tomatoes are usually planted two or three inches deeper.
6. Put water in the hole around each plant before the soil is replaced. If the soil is dry, a pint or more of water may be needed. Or still better, a pint of "starter" solution of liquid fertilizer may be used.
7. Press the soil firmly about the roots and cover with dry soil.
8. In hot, dry weather, the plants will start out better if they are shaded by a board or shingle set at a slant on the south side of the plant.
9. Transplants may be set out as soon as danger of frost is past and the soil warms up.
