Annual County Band Festival Saturday

The annual Coos County Band Festival will be held in Coquille Saturday, May 5. Bands which will participate are the Marshfield Junior High School, Myrtle Point High School, North Bend High School, Marshfield High School, and Coquille High Bands.

At 1:15 p. m. the street parade will begin. The line of march is from the formation point on W. Front St. near the Ko-Keel Village, along Front St. to Taylor, up Taylor to First, along First to Hall, up Hall to Second, along Second to S. Henry, to the High School.

The concert will begin promptly at 2:00 p. m. with each band participating playing two numbers. Each band will play one march and an overture of its own choice. At the close of the individual band numbers all bands will mass into one large unit and this massed band will play four numbers. The concert will be held in the high school and a charge of 25c plus 5c tax or a total of 30c will be charged for each admission.

John Stehn, University of Oregon Band Director, will be the guest conductor for the massed bands. Mr. Stehn appeared in Coos county several years ago and won much acclaim for his conducting and interpretation of band music. The band students of Coos county are fortunate in having the privilege of playing under Mr. Stehn's direction and the people of the county who attend will hear some fine band music.
