Five Coquille Men in England Commended by Gen. Doolittle

Among the 185,000 men and women of the Eighth Air Force congratulated in England on VE Day by Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, who assumed command of the Eighth in January, 1944, were Sgt. Elmer A. Barrows, Sergeant Burton R. Johnson, Sereant Frank D. Caudle, McKinley Rt., Sergeant George H. Strader and Private First Class Orville E. Roady, airview Rt., all of Coquille.

'I wish to extend my personal congratulations and my heartfelt appreiation to every one of you for the magnificient job you have done," Gen. Doolittle said in a message to

all personnel.
"Each of you," he continued "may be proud of your part in the defeat of Germany. I am proud of you. The world is proud of you."

The Eighth Air Force was the world's mightiest strategic bombing force. Its personnel of 185,000 was the equivalent of 12 infantry divisons, and it could send 21,000 airmen in 2,000 four-engined bombers and 1,090 fighters over Germany at one time, a combat effort possible only brough the support of tens of thousands of non-flying specialists.

Since August, 1942, when comb perations began, Flying Fortresser nd Liberators of the Eighth dropped ore than 700,000 tons of bombs on nemy targets. Fighter pilots shot down 5,250 Nazi planes and destroyed 4,250 others on the ground. Bomber gunners shot 6,000 German inter-

reptors out of the air.

The Eighth dropped an average of a ton of bombs every minute of the last 12 months




