After talking most of the night, they found that they had gone part way to the Philippines on the same convoy and landed the same day and had been in the same base for three weeks.

Jim has been in the service for three years and Harold for about six months less time.

He had received no mail while in the hospital until the last week he was there and had 84 letters in one mail call when it finally caught up with him.

For breakfast—CORN PANCAKES
1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup corn meal 2 eggs
1 1/2 tps. baking powder 2 tps. melted butter or margarine
1/4 tsp. soda - shortening or margarine

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with corn meal, baking powder, soda, sugar, and salt. Beat egg yolks, add milk and combine with dry ingredients, beating until smooth. Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoonfuls on moderately hot, lightly-greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles form on top surface. Bake until golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

DUMPLING DOUGH
2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk
Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoonfuls on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.
