Coquille Red Cross will meet Friday, June 15, from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. in Guild Hall to sew, knit, crochet, etc. Present sewing consists of bathrobes, bed shirts, bedside bags, regulation kit bags and scuff slippers. All these articles, with the exception of the regulation kit bags, are hospital requirements for our service men. The kit bags are given them when they leave for overseas duty. With approximately one thousand casualties being returned to our hospitals each day, it is easily understood why so much hospital sewing is necessary.

Mrs. D. B. Kesner, chairman of production, urges workers to continue sewing and knitting during the summer, in spite of Victory gardens, canning, etc. even though their output be a little less. Three and sometimes four, sewing machines are available at the workroom and cut-out materials and samples of work may be called for and taken home. Workers are again reminded to bring their own scissors and crochet hooks.

Mrs. Wm. Candlin, knitting chairman, has on hand yarn for sweaters and regular socks. Mrs. Briner and Mrs. Candlin are thanked for donations of cotton print and wool material.
