NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of District No. 8, of Coos County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of the said district will be held at the High School Building on the 13th day of July, 1944, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of discussing the budget for fiscal school year, beginning July 1, 1944, and ending June 30, 1946, hereinafter set forth, and at which time and place any person subject to such levy when made will be heard in favor of or against said proposed tax or levies or any part thereof.
