**People Are Nice**

When the city water pipes need attention and are dug from under the streets, as they have been in recent weeks, there are also brought to view lengths of wooden pipe that have an interesting story back of them. I thought you might like to hear it; so I found out what I could about it.

In the late eighteen hundreds, a group of enterprising citizens formulated plans for a city water system. The water was carried from Dutch John's Creek and Barrows Creek by way of V-shaped wooden troughs from a reservoir at the head of First street, to the city proper, where pipes were necessary.

J. B. Fox, who built the Middle fork road from Myrtle Point to Roseburg, contracted to make and to lay the pipes. Mr. Fox had a mill near the bridge which bears his name in Lee valley. The property is now owned and farmed by Mac and Ben Gant but Reuben Mast lived there at that time. The mill machinery was powered by horses.

The twelve-foot logs were tapered at the end and the centers were drilled out of them before the logs were forcefully driven together and held in place by iron collars. This was a very tedious process, since often the wooden pipes would split when forced together.

In about 1886 or 1887 this group of men formed the Occidental Water Co. O. C. Sanford recollects the company had been formed when he came here in 1888. It was perhaps 1890 when the wooden pipes were replaced with metal pipes. A concrete dam was built in 1903, and was used for a number of years before being replaced in 1922 by the present concrete storage reservoir. In 1939 twelve feet were added to the height of the reservoir, which holds about 77 million gallons of water.

The Occidental Water Co., of which A. J. Sherwood was president, was dissolved during the early nineteen hundreds, and the City Water Company was formed. I hope you found the pipe's story as interesting as I did.

I am grateful to Don Farr for calling the wooden pipes to my attention; to O. C. Sanford, who always takes time to answer questions in his kindly manner, and to all the others who gave me bits of information. If you know any facts I have missed, I will appreciate your sending a card or letter to tell me about it.

You should see the very young twin deer that play on a certain bend of the road over the mountain. They are such beautiful, friendly creatures, without any shyness usually ascribed to them. They hardly move out of the path of my car.
