The Sentinel Must Have Requests For Overseas Mailing

Your son or husband fighting in the Pacific with the Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard is just as much interested in news of his family, friends and home town as ever before. So here is a tip from the Navy, via postal officials in Coquille:

If you want to renew his subscription to the Coquille Valley Sentinel, or to any other magazine or newspaper, be sure to have him write to you requesting the renewal prior to its expiration date. Otherwise, his copies will not be accepted at the post office for mailing, in accordance with a new ruling issued by the Post Office Department and the Navy Department.

Here is another idea: Why not save his valuable reading time and the Navy's valuable cargo space by clipping items that will interest him from the pages of the Sentinel and sending them to him in a letter?

Things have changed since the boys first went to the Pacific to fight the Japs, and the Navy Department

has announced that it is no longer possible to send all the millions of newspapers and magazines to the millions of Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel now spread over the five million additional square miles that have been won from the Japs since 1941. Shipping space for essential war materials is at a premium.

Your letter, both V-mail and air-mail, are still considered highly essential and the Navy is redoubling its energies in sending these morale-builders out as far as possible. So are your packages—especially if they are well wrapped, carefully addressed, do not contain breakable or perishables, and if they are sent regularly throughout the year instead of in the mad scramble just before Christmas.

Keep sending letters and packages, but help the Navy conserve shipping space for guns, food, and other vital war supplies by curtailing second class matter. If you worry about this lack of reading matter, here is good news—The Navy is offsetting the curtailment of individual subscriptions by expanding its bulk shipments of magazines for overseas distribution, both in the number of copies and the range of selection.
