Oregon Rural Fire Crews Again Ready For Action

Approximately 400 rural fire crews in Oregon are organized and ready for action this year, as they have been since 1942, reports D. D. Robinson, extension forester at Oregon State college, in connection with national Farm Security week, July 22-28. While these have proved effective in saving many thousands of dollars in property damage and possibly lives, they cannot take the place of constant care in preventing fires starting, he says.

In the United States one farm fire occurs on an average of every 15 minutes, causing a daily loss of \$273,927. Oregon's farm fire loss is small in comparison, but it has averaged about \$400,000 a year from an estimated 400 fires.

"Time is important in the control of any fire, particularly on the farm," Robinson cautions. "If equipment is not available many fires can be stopped with little or no damage. Elaborate equipment is not necessary. Every farm can at least have barrels or cans of water at danger points with buckets submerged in them.

"An orchard spray rig kept filled and handy can put out more fire with less water than any professional fire equipment. Sprinkler irrigation systems can be used if outlets are planned in advance, and a common knapsack sprayer is a good fire extinguisher.
