Land Bank Wipes Out Federal Debt



Ownership of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane passed into the hands of its farmer-borrowers this week when the bank repaid the last block of federal funds in its capital structure.
Pictured above is R. E. Brown, bank president, signing a letter transmitting the final payment of \$1,500,000 to the federal government, which at one time had more than \$2,000,000 invested in the bank's capital and paid-in surplus. With this federal indebtedness wiped out of the books, the farmer- and stockman-owned national farm loan associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington became the sole owners of the bank.
In addition to repaying the gov-

ernment in full, the bank recently declared a 10 percent dividend and, in cooperation with the associations, developed a plan whereby the associations, which are local cooperatives extending long-term agricultural credit, were placed in a sound financial condition with adequate reserves to meet future contingencies. Former borrowers who had paid their loans in full but did not obtain the par value of their association stock will receive around \$2,000,000 in full settlement of their claims.
The 77 national farm loan associations in the four states, which are serving more than 20,000 borrower-members, now own a bank with total assets of \$68,000,000; capital stock of \$3,500,000, and reserves and surplus of \$9,300,000.
