Air Research To Help Keep U. S. In Lead

Leaders of industry have joined in endorsing a nation-wide program about to be launched by the Air Power League to promote adequate production research in aviation so that American leadership will be maintained after the war.

The program will be implemented by a fund of \$2,500,000 to be contributed by corporations and individuals, it is announced by Charles E. Wilson, president, General Electric Co. and the Air Power League.

"Unless we keep pace with all kinds of air research and development, we in American cannot hope to exert our influence in forwarding

the aims of democracy and cannot adequately safeguard our country from assault," Mr. Wilson said.
