

### S. Sgt. Dal Foote Visiting Here

S. Sgt. Dallas W. Foote, a member of the 87th (Golden Acorn) Infantry Division, has arrived safely from overseas duty, and reached Coquille on Tuesday of last week to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Foote, and other relatives on the Bay.

Sgt. Foote has been a member of the 87th division since its activation at Camp McCain, Mississippi in Nov., 1943. He was formerly assigned to the 81st (Wildcat) Division stationed at Camp Rucker, Ala.

Sgt. Foote embarked with the 249th Inf. Reg. of the 87th Div., in the latter part of 1944 and saw much action. He now holds the Good Conduct Medal, ETO ribbon with three bronze service stars, and the Combat Inf. Badge. He participated in the Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe campaigns, and saw action in France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany.

He is mess sergeant of Co. F, 346 Inf. and has had the difficult job of seeing that the combat infantrymen at the front receive warm and nourishing food whenever possible. He has always worked to the best of his ability to see that this job was carried out in all kinds of unfavorable weather at all hours.

He is spending most of his furlough with his wife, Mrs. Dora C. Foote, a civilian employee at Ft. Lewis, Wash. At the expiration of his furlough Sgt. Foote will report to Ft. Benning, Ga., for further training with the 346th Inf. Regt.

1st Sgt. Hugo C. Chapman and wife and their son, Clifford, are also here with Sgt. Foote. Sgt. Chapman is with the same regiment and company. They went overseas and returned with the same outfit at the same time and both plan on returning to Fort Lewis soon. They have 30-day recuperation leaves before training for the Pacific area.

### Ronald Dungey Made A Corporal In The Philippines

John R. Dungey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dungey of Coquille, has recently been promoted to Corporal in his photomapping company of the 648th Engineers, the Army's first mapping battalion overseas. He is stationed in Manila.

Before the war, Cpl. Dungey attended the Southern Oregon College of Education. He entered the service in February of 1943 and shipped overseas in November of that year.

The 648th Engineers, the organization to which Cpl. Dungey is attached as an aerial phototopographer, has functioned as the Base Map Plant for the South Pacific for more than three years. Cpl. Dungey's skilled work in determining topographic data from aerial photographs has helped his unit successfully map more than 128,000 square miles of enemy-held territory.

He has earned the Asiatic Pacific Campaign medal and the Philippine Liberation ribbon awarded by the Commonwealth government.

### Phillip Clausen, Assistant Radioman On Mindanao

Mr. and Mrs. Alton Clausen, of Riverton, were informed recently of an advancement of their son, Pvt. Phillip Clausen, on Mindanao, where he has been stationed for about a month with the 31st Div. of the Infantry. Pvt. Clausen has been moved up to the Company Headquarters as Assistant Radioman. He will be attending classes while receiving new training. Pvt. Clausen writes that the island is quite pretty and reminds him of Klamath Falls here in Oregon.

Sgt. Verner C. Stout arrived Wednesday for a thirty-day furlough, after spending three years overseas. Sgt. Stout came to Los Angeles from Honolulu by plane, making the trip in twelve hours.

### Norman McCool Writes His Mother

Mrs. Clara McCool-Kelley received a letter this week from her son, Corporal Norman McCool, in which he enclosed several pieces of Japanese paper money. This was the first letter she had received from him since March although, when he wrote July 31 from somewhere in the Pacific, he said he had written before.

Speaking of his recent injury, hospitalization and return to duty, he said: "The bullet hit me on the right side of my spine, and came out below my left ear. It tore up the muscles and nerves in my neck pretty badly when it came out. In fact, I was out of my head for a few days but I am as good as new now and there is nothing to worry about."

"I am now in a rest camp, if you can call it that. We have to be out of our tents from 7:00 in the morning until 4:30 in the afternoon, so you can see what I mean."

He then mentions seeing his Uncle Laurence and spending a Sunday with him, saying: "We had a good time together, considering where we are. He is a lot like Dad so we got along swell. He is supposed to come again tomorrow and spend the day with me."

"I still can't get my mind on things so I had better close. I will write again in a few days. I keep thinking of my old bunch of pals."

### "Buddy" Kyle Was Flown To Germany Last Thursday

Buddy Kyle, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Kyle, left New York, August 2, to fly to Germany, where he will be stationed on a ship in his capacity of Chief Machinist. The vessel is a former German ship, recently taken over by the U. S., and will dock in New York, some time in September.

### Lieut. Chas. Mulkey Crossed Equator Twice Recently

Lieut. Charles Mulkey, who left the U. S. A. in March for overseas service as a night fighter piloting a Black Widow, last week wrote his mother, Mrs. Martha Mulkey Purdy, that he had just completed a mission which took him over the equator twice and over the International Date Line twice, before his return to his station at Oahu, Hawaii.

Mrs. Chas. Mulkey, the former Marjory Hardenbrook, is with her parents in Boise, Idaho.

### Sulpha Drug Caused His Discharge From The Army

New residents of the Coquille valley are Mr. and Mrs. Oren Iveys and family, who have taken over the Barklaw dairy farm at Norway. Mr. Iveys received a medical discharge from the Army, June 7, due to an incurable skin condition induced by the use of sulpha drug administered for a throat disorder. No test was given previous to the dosage and Mr. Iveys is one of the few persons poisoned by the use of sulpha drugs. Army physicians state that perhaps six persons out of a thousand recover from this form of mellitus. Iveys had taken paratrooper training previous to his five months' hospitalization at Fort Benning and was in the service eleven months, entering from North Bend. The family formerly lived at Riverton.
