Will Operate A New Coal Mine

Three Coquille men, Peter R. Tully, James Brady and K. P. Gorrwell, have leased from Coos county the mineral rights on a tract of land north of the old lumbering camp at Laneve on the North Bank road, and are preparing to develop a coal mine there.

Their lease is on a royalty basis and is for a ten-year period, with a clause inserted that royalties, after the first three years, may be renegotiated.

They have already graded a road for 2,180 feet from the entrance of the mine to the chrome road, and they expect to build bunkers there. They are not yet ready to begin getting coal out but hope to be in the not distant future. From what they have seen thus far they believe the coal will be of a fine quality.

George E. Oerding Completes Three Real Estate Deals

The home located at 459 N. Beach street, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Davidson, was sold by George E. Oerding, a local realtor, to Mr. and Mrs. Carl E. Mescham. The Meschams have moved into their newly purchased home and Mrs. Davidson, with her children, are making their home with her mother in Coos Bay. Roy Davidson is in the armed forces.

The second deal was the sale of the Sunset Dairy, consisting of the milk route, all personal property and equipment pertaining to it and the lease on the George Lorenz ranch. The property was sold to Joe Slinko and the former owner was Wayne Watson, who has successfully operated the business for a number of years. Mr. Watson will make an announcement soon as to his new endeavor.

The third deal completed by Mr. Oerding was the sale of two lots on Knowlton Avenue, on which are located three homes and which were owned by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Preussler. These houses were sold to Warren E. Troutman, who is a member of the Coast Guard and who purchased the property as an investment. He will continue to rent the houses through the property management department of Mr. Oerding's office. Mr. Preussler is operating a small saw mill in Fairview.

Lamb Producers Now Eligible For Sheep and Lamb Slaughter

Coos county producers are now eligible to receive government payments on sheep and lambs marketed for slaughter, according to information which has been received at the County AAA office.

The new program which became effective August 5, provides that payment shall be made on all sales to legally authorized slaughterers by presenting invoices and sales slips which are used as a basis for the payments.

Payment rates for August are \$1.50 a cwt. for lambs weighing between 65 pounds and 90 pounds \$2.15 a cwt. on lambs weighing over 90 pounds and \$1.00 a cwt. on all other sheep and lambs.

The program as announced will extend through June 30, 1946. Rates of payment will vary from month to month from the minimum set up for August up to \$2.50 per cwt. on lambs weighing between 65 and 90 pounds and \$3.15 per cwt. on lambs weighing over 90 pounds. The rate for sheep and for lambs less than 65 pounds will remain at a \$1.00 a cwt. throughout this year.

The subsidy payment of 95c a cwt. formerly made to packers was discontinued on August 4 so that all government payments are now made directly through producers. Payments will be issued by the County AAA committee in the form of a sight draft on the Commodity Credit Corp. similar to the Dairy Feed and Beef programs and the necessary application forms and instructions will be on hand at the county office within the next few days it is stated.
