## "New Phones Still Hard To Obtain"

"No production of new telephones for general civilian use has yet been announced and as a consequence the shortage of receivers for house installation continues," Harry Chap-man, Manager of the West Coast Telephone Company, revealed here today.

Two hundred orders have piled up for future filling in the southwestern Oregon area, Chapman said. These are processed according to the order of their filing and also in compliance with WPB installation orders. First installations go to persons directly connected with the war effort.

Mr. Chapman said that government orders required the telephone company to take out installed phones when new tenants occupied a property and to reinstall the telephones with prior applicants, save where the new renters could submit documentary evidence they are entitled to priority.


