Tuberculosis Death Rate Declined In 1944

The nation-wide tuberculosis death rate continued to decline throughout 1944, according to provisional figures just received at headquarters of the Oregon Tuberculosis association here from the national association.

The decline represents 3,000 fewer deaths from the disease in 1944 than in 1943. The 1944 rate for the entire country was 40.8 per 100,000 population, or 54,123 deaths, while the 1943 rate was 42.6 or 58,005 deaths.

The number of deaths in Oregon declined from 271 in 1943 to 268 in 1944.

Dr. Kendall Emerson, managing director of the national association, called the decline definitely encouraging as this country has been facing a threatened wartime rise.

He warned, however, that the danger is not past, "Because of the long course of the disease, the full effect of wartime conditions on tuberculosis control in this country may not be known for several years."

Two major factors, according to Dr. Emerson, undoubtedly contributed to the continued decline of tuberculosis during war years. First, the American civilian population has not had to undergo dire wartime conditions, including severe malnutrition.

Second, the recent expansion of mass x-ray, particularly among industrial workers, conducted by health departments and tuberculosis associations, has discovered many new cases.

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Farm Financing Is Now Available

Coos and Curry county farmers, returning servicemen and war workers unable to finance sound farming channels, can now make use of all Farm Security services as funds for the new fiscal year which began July 1, are available, reports T. Brudos, County FSA Supervisor, Room 14, Bank Building, Coquille.

"Every effort will be made to meet the needs of farmers just establishing themselves on farms in the county or resident farmers requiring management and credit assistance for profitable operations," Brudos said. "The County FSA committee, which reviews all loan applications, believes that FSA loans combined with management help can contribute to improved dairy stock, farm buildings, small water facilities and increased farm income from more efficient farm operations."

FSA supervised loans can be made for purchase of needed livestock, machinery, seed, feed, household goods, tractors, wells, sprinkler systems, building improvements, advance cash rent and nearly every farm operating expense or item, explained Brudos. Loans can be made to family-type farm owners or renters, and for sound part-time farming operations. Loans are limited to \$2,500 and can be repaid up to five years with interest at five per cent on the unpaid balance. A limited number of 40-year farm ownership loans can also be made in the county providing suitable farms can be purchased within their long time values.

County FSA committees, who are all practical farmers will be glad to advise with farmers on FSA services. Committeemen include Ed Detlefsen, Coquille; J. Q. Corrie, Prosper; Leland Peterson, Coquille. Office days for the FSA Supervisor are 9:00 to 3:00 on Mondays and 9:00 to 12:00 on Saturdays.

An Appeal For Railroad Workers In Oregon

In a statewide appeal to all Oregonians capable of doing railroad work, Major Thomas F. McCaul, of the District Transportation Office of the Army Service Forces, reveals that there is an immediate need for 65,000 additional workers on western railroads.

"The Army's gigantic redeployment program," he says, "is seriously handicapped and in danger of breaking down unless western railroads obtain badly needed manpower. In Oregon our railway systems must have 2,000 more workers during the month of August alone. We need men and women, skilled and unskilled, to help see to it that troops and supplies being transferred from the European theatre get to the Pacific war as soon as possible. We want to defeat Japan quickly, and our delivery system at the present time is gravely threatened."

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"New Phones Still Hard To Obtain"

"No production of new telephones for general civilian use has yet been announced and as a consequence the shortage of receivers for house installation continues," Harry Chapman, Manager of the West Coast Telephone Company, revealed here today.

Two hundred orders have piled up for future filling in the southwestern Oregon area, Chapman said. These are processed according to the order of their filing and also in compliance with WPB installation orders. First installations go to persons directly connected with the war effort.

Mr. Chapman said that government orders required the telephone company to take out installed phones when new tenants occupied a property and to reinstall the telephones with prior applicants, save where the new renters could submit documentary evidence they are entitled to priority.
