Sergeant (Technician Fourth Grade) Nathaniel Chineworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Chineworth of Coquille, has returned to the U. S. under the readjustment regulations with a high total of 110 points.

T/4 Chineworth enlisted April 24, 1941, and was stationed at Schofield Barracks, Oahu, T. H. Upon the activation of the 24th, he was assigned to "G" Company, 21st Regiment where he has remained, for the most part, during his entire period overseas.

From January to April, 1942, Chineworth was on a Task Force to Canton Island. His outlook on that barren rock includes sand, wind, humid sunny days, and the conspicuous "gooney birds."

Chineworth has been a cook, but this has not deterred him from being where the "hot spots" were, as when he served meals at the front lines. He participated in the Leyte, Mindoro, and Mindanao operations, in addition to the airborne landing at Dipolog, Zamboanga.

Because of his long service and many days in combat, Sgt. Chineworth now wears the pre-Pearl Harbor, Asiatic-Pacific, and Philippine Liberation Ribbons, each with a bronze star, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Clarence McNair Is Home On Thirty-Day Furlough

T/4 Clarence N. McNair arrived August 18, for a furlough of thirty days before reporting to Fort Lewis. McNair was with the 11th Armored Division in Germany, as was Ben Payne. The young men were together in the battle of the Bulge, but Ben was injured and subsequently hospitalized; while Clarence was uninjured and advanced with his comrades. Ben Payne is at a rest station in Santa Barbara just now, and the two haven't met since their return to the States.
