New Policies, Procedures Of The War Labor Board

Dr. George Bernard Noble, chairman of the 12th Regional War Labor Board today announced that WLB will follow the following policies and procedures, under President Truman's recent Executive Order:

1. Wage or salary increases may be made without the approval of the Board, upon the condition that such increases will not be used, in whole or in part, as the basis for seeking an increase in price ceilings, or for resisting otherwise justifiable reductions in price ceilings, or, in the case of products or services being furnished under contract with a federal procurement agency, will not increase the cost to the United States; provided, however, that such increases are agreed to by the duly certified or recognized representative of the employees involved, if there is such a representative.

2. New and pending voluntary applications for wage increases which require price relief will be processed under provisions of the President's Executive Order.

3. Dispute cases now before the RWLB on which the vote on wage issues was not completed prior to the close of business on August 16, 1945, will be governed by the new Executive Order, but application of the new policy will not be retroactive to any date earlier than the effective date of the Order.

4. Dispute cases on which the vote on wage issues was completed by the RWLB prior to the close of business August 16, 1945, will be governed by terms of the policy which prevailed as of that date.

5. Dispute appeals and appeals from rulings on voluntary applications requiring price relief will be handled as expeditiously as possible. The old wage policy will apply to all cases on appeal which were decided prior to the close of business on August 16, 1945. The RWLB will endeavor to forward all appeals to the National Board within the next 30 days.

Crack Ack-Ack Battalion Operates Staging Area Near Southampton, England

The 550th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion—veteran unit of tough fighting in Germany—is now operating Barton Stacey Staging Area, one of three holding centers at the Southampton, England, port of embarkation. Their new job, members of the 550th act as "housekeepers" for the huge Barton Stacey Camp where American troops awaiting shipment to the United States are staged. The capacity of the camp—7,400—makes it possible to stage exactly half the number of troops which may be carried on the "Queen Mary" or the "Queen Elizabeth" on a single voyage to the United States.

Before taking on this job, the 550th played a prominent part in the downfall of Germany. The unit almost reached the border of Czechoslovakia before V-E Day was declared. In the area of Chemnitz, the 550th participated in stopping one of the final come-back attempts of the Luftwaffe. One of the members of this battalion is Corporal Ellis H. Neal, whose home is on the Coquille-Arango route.

POST-WAR FLYING IN YOUR HOME TOWN

One of the four fundamentals of our nation's airpower is personal flying and public air-mindedness. The other three are (1) a strong, permanent air force; (2) the fullest development of air commerce; (3) a progressive aircraft industry based on continued technological superiority.

Local Flying to Aid American Air Power The development of personal flying and the building of air landing facilities is more than a community affair. It is very much in the national interest.

At the beginning of the United States has done much to win the wars. It will do much to provide for our future security as well as build American business.

At the beginning of both World War I and World War II air-minded America was still lacking in air power. Although the first successful flight with a heavier-than-air machine was made in America, although many of the foremost improvements in flying technique and aircraft construction were the result of American ingenuity, when war came, the United States lagged far behind.

This was particularly true in the number of trained flyers and of air mechanics. Vast training camps had to be established and from our comparatively few trained men and women, a substantial number had to be side-tracked into the instruction of America's youth.

Today, literally millions of young people know flying. They are the nucleus of both our military and civilian aviation of the future. It is necessary that the United States keep them trained and interested in flying. This can be done, only if there are planes for them to fly and fields from which to take off and on which to land.

Unless communities in every part of the nation provide these facilities the future of aviation will be very uncertain, government officials and the military services agree, and if America loses its supremacy in the air, our country will be wide open to aggression from other lands. Then too, America now leads the world in commercial air transportation. The commercial pilots, co-pilots and other air and ground crewmen of tomorrow will, in large measure, be the young people of today, who have learned to fly their own personal airplanes.

Thus the future of aviation, and in it the future of America, lies in the development of community flying. Many towns and communities have registered their intention to do their share... to build landing facilities and encourage local flying. More communities will join the movement, for economic or other reasons, until there will be a complete network of facilities in every state. Thus United States Air Power will be assured.

This is the ninth and last of a series of articles on post-war flying and its effect on community life.

Coast Guard Still Needs Young Men Of 17 Years Recruiting of young men 17 years of age has been reopened by the United States Coast Guard, the Coast Guard recruiting station at 806 S. W. Morrison Street, Portland, was notified this week.

Oregon and Washington recruits will receive basic training at Alameda, California. Many will be sent on to advanced schools for special training.

Applicants must be 17, at least 64 inches in height with weight in proportion to height, in good health and have at least two years' high school, parent's consent and a birth certificate. Vision must be 20/30.

Recruits will be enlisted in the regular Coast Guard, for three-year periods. Wartime recruiting was for the Coast Guard Reserve, members signing up to serve "the duration and six months" or less.
