

Curtis Beckham To Head Coos O.S.T.A.

New officers of the Coos County division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association elected at the two-day session in Coos Bay, October 4-5, were: Curtis Beckham, Myrtle Point, president; Charles Meyer, Coquille, vice-president; Helen Thomas, Coquille, secretary-treasurer.

On the first day of the meeting Dr. Harry L. Dillin, president of Linfield College, gave a memorable address entitled, "Whither America." In enumerating economic problems America must solve, he gave the place of first importance to minorities, specifying the Negro situation as outstanding. Dr. Dillin laid the blame for their plight on the feudal organizations of the South and declared that we forget democracy is as much a protection of the minority as the rule of the majority. There must be freedom among the nations, with smaller nations equal, not subservient.

Dr. Dillin mentioned ex-president Hoover's fifth freedom, freedom of initiative, and added one of his own, freedom of empire. In emphasizing the importance of relief to the devastated nations, he stated: "We must restore and raise the standard of living in all nations if we hope to restore our own." He brought out

the fact that we must preserve peace by establishing international economy, which can be both by democratic capitalism and communism.

Dillin further declared there must be a growth of unity among nations and spoke for establishment of an international bank as well as international trade. He charged the teachers with the responsibility of putting across these new ideas in the education of youth.

At the close of the sessions on Friday, Larry Lillebo, of North Bend, who was formerly president of the Coos County Teacher's Association, carried in a lovely tier table holding a potted vine. After a suitable presentation speech by Mrs. Ruth Boyers of Coquille, the gift was handed to the surprised county superintendent of schools, Mrs. Martha Mulkey Purdy, as a wedding gift from the organization.

Now hot breads can enhance your meals

Hot muffins and rolls give that extra zip to the meals you're serving these Fall days when there's just a hint of frost in the air. While dinner is in the making make full use of your oven heat by baking some of the old favorites listed below.

Surprise Muffins are a treat for a special breakfast. Break them open for the surprise inside. Spoon muffin batter into well greased muffin pans; place 1/2 teaspoon jam or jelly on top. Bake in a moderately hot oven (425° F) 20 minutes. Serves 12.

Tomato Biscuits give flavor and color to old standbys. Simply use tomato juice instead of milk in a standard baking powder biscuit recipe. A few caraway seeds sprinkled on top of the biscuits add flavor interest too.

Supper Rolls—Place 1/4 cup shortening, 1 teaspoon salt, and 2 tablespoons sugar into large bowl and add 1 1/2 cups lukewarm water; stir well. Stir in one beaten egg and one fresh yeast crumb. Add 3 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour all at once and beat with fork to make a soft dough. Spoon batter into well-greased muffin pans, filling half full. Cover with a damp cloth and let rise about 1 hour, or until light. Bake in moderately hot oven (425° F) 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 18 rolls.
