As a child in Indianapolis, Jan acquired a local reputation for his impersonations of John Phillip Sousa. He looked forward to being a baseball player rather than a band-leader, however, and pursued the diamond path until a ball broke his nose. He then applied himself so vigorously to the violin that in a few years he was soloist with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra. His reward was the leadership of a 56-piece brass band, paid by Uncle Sam, for whose A. E. F. Jan was one of the first to volunteer. After being mustered out he organized a string trio, but soon realized the trend would be toward "hokum," at which he is also a master. He started a "hotcha" band and became known as the "Originator of Hokum." After a long and successful career with this style he abandoned it for the opposite one, soft, sweet music, and the title, "The Idol of the Airplanes." Currently he has again moved with the tide by synthesizing the two into "sweet swing."


