

Gala Display Set For Shrine Ceremonial

Color, pomp and fun intermixed with a bit of seriousness will prevail on Coquille streets, homes, and hotel lobby Saturday, Nov. 24, when 600 Shriners from the western states meet here for the annual Fall Ceremonial.

Arriving by buses especially chartered for the occasion, and by private automobiles, will be potentates and leading Shriners from Nevada, California, Idaho, Washington, and Oregon. Some Shriners are expected from every Shrine Temple in the area.

Reno, Nevada, has signified its intention of being a part of the ceremonial, as have Los Angeles, Pasadena, Sacramento, San Francisco, and other California points.

Many Washington Shriners Oregon will be well represented. From Washington, Puget Sound cities, and cities of the Inland Empire will trek to Coquille and Coos county.

According to K. P. Lawrence, in charge of arrangements, this will be the first opportunity many of the Shriners have had to take part in a postwar ceremonial, with all bans off. Mr. Lawrence looks forward to a colorful spectacle that will please the eye, and attract much interest.

A street parade in full regalia, including the ever familiar fox, with drill teams and band will wind through the downtown section, finally meeting at the Hotel Coquille where it will enter the hotel.

The new candidates will be put through their initiation in the evening after a banquet.

Loggers from Coos and Curry counties are urged to take part in the logging confab to be held at the Osborn Hotel, Eugene, November 16 and 17. It was announced today by H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette valley association.

C. C. Jacobsen, Toledo logger, will lead a discussion on logging techniques. Victor Torrey and Bert Ross, former Coos Bay loggers, will also lead panels on new logging methods.

Colonel W. B. Greeley, nationally prominent forester, will give the main address at the loggers' banquet Friday night, at which Ray Morse, logging superintendent from Longview will be toastmaster.

New logging equipment and road building and construction will be discussed by Walter F. McCulloch.

A strictly ladies' banquet for wives of the loggers will be a new feature of the banquet this year.

Company Promises Continual Run Of Former Smith Woods Operation

Coos Bay Lumber company announced today that it began hiring for its new Coquille plant, through J. W. Forrester, company manager. Since the purchase of Smith Wood-Products, the union contract is now nullified, and a future contract depends upon certification of a union by the National Labor Relations board.

According to J. W. Forrester, the plant will resume operation immediately following the hiring of a crew.

Final papers closing the sale of the Smith Wood-Products company at Coquille, and the extensive holdings of the Laird, Benham and Laird Logging company on the East Fork of the Coquille river were signed late last week.

Arrangements had already been made with the O. and C. Land Grant division of the state for perpetual yield cutting when a special delegation of local citizens, led by Mayor Orville Wood with Coos Bay Lumber company officials, visited the O. and C. offices in Portland and arranged for selective cutting on the timbered areas in this section.

Red Devils Batter Bobcats 45-7 Before Huge Crowd Here Monday

"Spike" Leslie's Coquille eleven, scoring at will before the largest home game crowd of the season, dealt the Myrtle Point Bobcats a crushing defeat of 45 to 7, in the traditional Armistice game Monday. It looked like another wet day to everyone after a week of rain but old man weather gave the spectators and

players a break, the sun shining most of the game.

Coquille's brilliant offensive was really clicking, in the air and on the ground, sparked by Capt. Dave Kline's selection of plays, George Johnson's accurate left-handed passing to sticky-fingered Stacy Johnson and Bob Jenkins, and last but not least fleet-footed Tom Boots who himself made 171 of Coquille's 236 yards from scrimmage. The Bobcat backfield crippled by the loss of fullback Ray, ran into plenty of trouble against the Coquille forward wall consisting of S. Johnson and Jenkins as ends, Williams and Chezem as tackles, Blum and Dykes as guards, and Aasen as center who was backing up the left side of the Red Devil line.

Boots Sprints 58 Yards
Coquille's initial play of the game

gave the crowd their first thrill of the afternoon and completely baffled the Bobcats, four of whom almost tackled Kline thinking he had the ball, when it was actually tucked under Boots' arm while he sprinted 58 yards to pay-dirt. The lead was short-lived, however, for the Bobcats, showing plenty of power, marched 62 yards in 14 plays, including a 37 pass from Don Sutphin to Wilson, for their only touchdown of the afternoon, Roper scoring it from the 2. Sutphin's pass was good for the conversion putting the Pointers in the lead 7-6. Coquille's second bid for a touchdown came early in the second quarter when Sutphin quick-kicked from his own 2, after being set back there by Kline's beautiful punt; Boots taking the kick on the Bobcat 45 and returning it to the 30. On the next play Boots picked up

15 more around end and four plays later punched it over from the 3. Kline went through the middle for the point, which put the Red Devils out in front 13-7.

Coquille's aerial attack went into action on midway in the second period to give the Devils their third score, it started when Coquille took the ball on downs on their own 32. McKinney advanced the ball five yards and on the next two plays, a 31 yard heave by Johnson to Jenkins, and a 26-yard pass to Stacy Johnson on the 6-yard line, who went over standing up. The Red Devils came back again for another touchdown, when Bob Jenkins recovered Kline's kick-off on the Myrtle Point 40-yard stripe, making it in three plays, the scoring coming from Johnson's pass to Jenkins. The closing minutes of the half found the

Bobcats marching goalward only to be stopped when Pierce intercepted Sutphin's pass.

Bobcats Kick Out

Midway in the third period, after intercepting a Coquille pass the Bobcats quick-kicked out to Boots on their 40 who returned it to the 31. Then in two plays, Boots carrying on both, the Red Devils did it again, to make it 31-7. Kline then, kicked off to the Bobcats and on their first play he intercepted Brown's pass and was downed on the Myrtle Point 42. Boots then went to the 10 on a pass from Johnson, from where end Bob Jenkins on an end around pass-play tossed the ball to Stacy Johnson for the score.

The last Red Devil touchdown came about midway in the final quarter when Boots intercepted a Bobcat pass on his 10 and returned it to his

20. In six plays, including a 30-yard pass from Johnson to Jenkins, who went another 20 yards before he was downed, the Red Devils went 80 yards to score, the touchdown coming on a pass from Johnson to Stacy Johnson. Quarterback Johnson's toss to Jenkins was good for the point.

Aasen stopped the following Myrtle Point drive when he recovered a Bobcat fumble on his 10-yard line, just as "Spike" sent in his second team, who managed to gain 20 yards in three plays against the Bobcats. End Harry Slack made 11 yards on a pass from Johnson and freshman halfback Bud Buckles hitting the line for seven. Myrtle Point then intercepted a Red Devil pass and Sutphin had just completed a pass to Wilson on the Coquille 20 as the game ended.
