our own seem to naturally fit together and under efficient operation will support a very high level of employment for a great many years to come from the timber now in the company's ownership.

"We believe that negotiations now developing with the government agencies controlling very large bodies of intermixed and contiguous timber might well result in making these operations perpetual in some form or another.

To Develop New Processes

"We are trying to develop subsidiary processes to use a lot of the so-called waste from the plants and logging operations. We want to turn it into something more useful than hog fuel. This development depends, of course, among other factors, on an adequate water supply being developed (a matter of great interest incidentally to the whole Coos Bay district) and primarily, of course, on our ability to produce an article or articles of such merit and at such costs as to give reasonable assurance that the venture will be successful.

"We need everybody's help in carrying these matters through successfully.

"The real point of this notice is to bring to your attention the Coos Bay Lumber company operations, barring terrible fires, atomic bombs or matters of that kind, will have a very long life; probably much longer than 90 per cent of the operations now existing in our general timber producing areas.

Family Security Protected

"Therefore, any employee of the company who carries his fair share of doing good work might feel much more peace of mind in developing a real home at Coos Bay or Coquille. After all most of us have our minds pretty well set on doing as well as we can for our families.

"Good men and women workers who have an interest in the success of the company are very much needed. Their welfare and advancement would naturally go along with the success and development of the company.

"As soon as possible we plan to put the big mill at Coos Bay and the plywood plant at Coquille on two shifts; also expanding the refining processes at Millington and the cedar plant at Coquille. This means we must develop a greater and consistent log supply.

More Workers Wanted

You will do the company a favor, or rather help us all, to notify the company officials at Coos Bay or Coquille of anyone you know who is a good workman and might be available.

"We would like to have the name and the fact of having the kind of people at Coos Bay and Coquille, and in the logging camps, that operators from the Skagit River in Washington to the Coconino Forest in Arizona will try to coax them away.

"We believe the prospects and conditions are such at Coos Bay and Coquille that they will want to stay."
