Lumbering circles and loggers regard the elevation of Smith to the top spot in the Logging Conference as a great boost to logging in general and a decided compliment to Coos county as the growing seat of the lumber empire of the nation.

A large delegation of Coquille people attended the seventh annual Willamette Valley Logging Conference in Eugene Nov. 16-17, at the Hotel Osburn.

From Coquille went Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Kline, Mr. and Mrs. George Burr, Al Smith, Julius Benham, Kenneth Laird, Ron Burr and Stan Sherwood.

According to George Burr the meeting was one of the most successful he has ever attended. A group of engineers from the state, including State High Engineer R. H. Baldeck, sat around a panel discussion table and listened to the problems of truck logging. It is believed that a definite understanding was reached between logging operators and state highway men at the meeting.

"G. I. Logging" Heard

One of the most interesting and thought-provoking discussions was entitled "G. I. Logging" when William Hagenstein who was in charge of all the logging operations for the army in Guadalcanal and other South Pacific islands, told of the work and methods his men had to use in the tropical islands as they cut down 100 foot tropical hardwood trees, often times filled with snipers of the enemy.

New developments in the field of trucks and heavy equipment were also shown.

A "Loggerette Banquet" was a feature of the conference this year at which all the women dined while their husbands had their annual banquet.

Coos County Farmers Will Choose Important Committees

Farmers of Coos county will choose committeemen who will supervise the agricultural conservation and other farm programs during 1946 at community election meetings which will be held for each of the five communities in the county, according to J. D. Carl, chairman of the 1945 County committee.

The meetings have been scheduled in each community as follows:

Tuesday, November 27 at 1:30 p. m.—Coos Bay Mutual Creamery, Coos Bay, for North Bend and Marshfield communities.

Wednesday, November 28 at 1:30 p. m.—City Hall, Bandon for Bandon community.

Thursday, November 29 at 1:30 p. m.—Smith-Hughes rooms, high school in Myrtle Point for Myrtle Point community.

Friday, November 30 at 1:30 p. m.—City Hall, Coquille, for Coquille community.

All farmers and ranchers who are participating in the Agricultural Conservation Program are eligible to vote for committeemen at these meetings and are urged by the chairman to attend and help elect leaders for next year. A large attendance at the meetings will assure the election of committeemen who are the choice

of all farmers in the community.

Committees To Be Chosen

Committeemen to be chosen include a chairman, vice chairman, regular member, and two alternates. Also to be chosen is a delegate to the county convention which will elect the county committee for 1946, following the meetings in each community. The committee chosen to the "board of directors" of the county association will supervise the job of rationing conservation funds so as to promote practices that will have the greatest value to farmers in conserving soil and water and will have charge of local operation of government price support programs which promises to become increasingly important to every farmer during agriculture's transition from war to peace-time production, Carl stated.

The state handbook includes some 47 conservation practices and those present will have an opportunity of discussing for recommendation those practices which will be most helpful to agriculture in this county during the next year. Coos county's allotment of funds will not be enough to pay on all practices so it is important to select those which will be most helpful, the chairman stated.
