The Coquille high school's basketball teams open the season with two games against Bandon Saturday evening, December 8, at the high school gymnasium. The "B" team are scheduled to start their game at 7:00. Return games have been arranged at Bandon the following Saturday evening, December 15.

The class "B" jamboree to be held at Coquille high school gym, is scheduled for Tuesday evening, December 11. Those teams entering are the Coquille "B" team, Bandon, Powers and Coos River.

Jamboree Has Three Quarters The jamboree is arranged so that each team will play the equivalent of three quarters with each of the other competing teams. Some fast and versatile ball is promised by these teams.

A Class "A" Jamboree is scheduled this season at North Bend high school for Friday evening, December 14. This will include the four Class "A" teams of Coos county—Coquille, Myrtle Point, North Bend and Marshfield high schools.

The regular league games between the county teams start Friday night, January 4, Coquille playing Myrtle Point at Myrtle Point. The first home game will be Tuesday evening, January 8, with North Bend playing Coquille here. Both "A" and "B" teams will play.

Frank Cox, Sr., passed away early Tuesday morning at the Coffey Memorial Hospital, Portland, following an operation three weeks ago.

He was born in Illinois April 9th, 1875, coming west with his parents by wagon train when he was four years of age, settling in Douglas county in 1892, where he lived until coming to Coos county in 1893.

Mr. Cox owned and operated several hotels in Coos and Douglas counties and later with his son, Frank, Jr., started the City Transfer business in Bandon which they operated for a number of years, later selling to W. R. Ward.

He was an active member in community affairs and will be greatly missed by his family and many friends.

Mrs. Cox preceded him in death six months ago, after an extended illness.

If it is found that further treatment is needed and can not be financed through the patient's family, other arrangements will be provided for the care.

President Truman Writes Welcome To "Bud" Gaffey

The following letter was received by "Bud" Gaffey, son of Mrs. Hattie Gaffey. "Bud" was a prisoner of the Japanese for three years and three months, reaching home October 6. He and his mother left Wednesday to visit relatives in San Francisco, where they hope to be joined by "Bud's" younger brother who expects his discharge shortly:

The White House, Washington 25 November 1945
Dear Wilford Ivan Gaffey: It gives me special pleasure to welcome you back to your native shores, and to express, on behalf of the people of the United States, the joy we feel at your deliverance from the hands of the enemy. It is a source of profound satisfaction that our efforts to accomplish your return have been successful. You have fought valiantly and have suffered greatly. As your Commander in Chief, I take pride in your past achievements and express the thanks of a grateful Nation for your services in combat and your steadfastness while a prisoner of war. May God grant you happiness and a successful future.

St. James' Church Sets New Budget

A new and higher budget was set at the annual meeting for this business at the St. James' Episcopal church on November 30th. In preparation for becoming a church and progressing away from the mission under diocesan aid, the budget committee consisting of Charles Selbig, Alton Grimes and Luckey Bonney, submitted their report.

James' parish during the past three years was also pointed out. In his report to the men of the parish, the Rev. Robert Greene pointed to record of confirmations in the years in which the Reverends George Turney and Charles Guilbert were vicars in Coquille. His report also cited the large class of communicants of this fall under his instruction. He gave credit to his predecessors and to the work of his members.

Plans were made to build a new vicarage, and to grant the building committee to go ahead with all necessary details.

It was also planned that on January, 1947, the St. James' Episcopal group would come into full church status, and so be recognized by the bishopric.

The house of representatives Tuesday passed a bill authorizing payment of \$6191 to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Hannon, Coquille, for damages to their home when a navy airplane crashed into it October 13, 1944.

A provision to pay Mrs. Hannon for personal injuries was deleted. This amendment caused return of the bill.

He was born on Prince Edward Island, Canada, July 31, 1879. He was 66 years, four months and one day.

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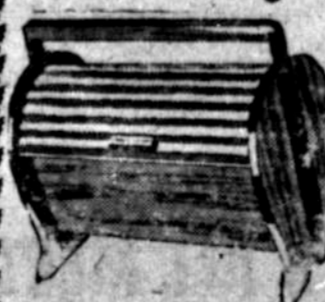
