Joe Louis Will Appear In Eugene December 12th

EUGENE, Dec. 6—(Special)—The biggest boxing attraction ever to appear in up-state Oregon will be world heavyweight champion Joe Louis when he steps into the ring at McArthur court in Eugene, Wednesday night, Dec. 12. It will be Louis' final public appearance before he meets Billy Conn next June.

Louis will box four rounds against best opponent that Don Owen, Eugene boxing and wrestling promoter, can find. It will definitely not be an exhibition against one of Louis' sparring partners. The match will be supported by two six-round boxing bouts and a pair of outstanding wrestling matches.

Louis' appearance will be the biggest sports extravaganza ever staged in Eugene and will be the first time a world champion has appeared in Oregon outside of Portland. Jack Dempsey, former world heavyweight champion, attracted 10,000 fight fans at McArthur court in 1931 after he had lost his title to Gene Tunney.

Ticket prices have been set at \$5 for ringside, \$3.50 for reserved seats, and \$2.50 for general admission, tax included. Reservations can be made at the Club cigar store in Eugene. Promoter Owen is anticipating a capacity crowd.
