

Soroptimists Receive Letters From English Correspondent Upon Receipt Of Gifts

Three letters from a Soroptimist in England, concerning the receipt of packages sent by the local group, were read for the benefit of the 14 members present for the Soroptimist Christmas party and gift exchange held in the Coffee Shop at noon, December 11.

Mrs. N. I. R. Clarke, club secretary of Chester, England, wrote all of the letters, each one of which was different from the others. Georgianna Vaughan, local president, Pauline Pettit and Estelle Harbison were those present who received letters from Mrs. Clarke, who informed them that of the eight packages shipped from here during the past year, four reached their destination. The following letter was the one received by Mrs. Estelle Harbison, publicity chairman for the Soroptimists:

116 Liverpool Road, Chester, England
Dear Mrs. Harbison: Again I am writing to you as I understand you have received no acknowledgement from us thanking you for the lovely parcel. I think it arrived about June of this year and we were all thrilled with the contents. Each parcel we received, we opened at our meeting and auctioned the contents, putting the money in our service fund. We greatly enjoyed the myrtlewood. I think it was bought by the speaker. He was a professor at Liverpool University and was speaking on the various "Utopias."

Although we have had a very thin time in England during the war we have managed to enjoy ourselves. For our parties we all bring something and usually we produce a feast of sorts. I think the conditions now are worse than they have ever been. We cannot buy much, and of course, we are all very tired, indeed.

I, myself, am an occupational therapist at the county mental hospital, Chester. I have a daughter, 18, my husband died when she was a year old. I have a small house near the hospital. I have had no domestic help since 1939, and am working from nine to four-thirty; then finishing house cleaning and shopping, always cycling as the buses are full when they reach us from Liverpool. All business and profes-

sional women have difficulty with the food, because we cannot get around the shops to get any extras, fish or fruit when there is any. Of course, we get our bare rations. It took me three months to get a pair of shoes for Sheila, and then I had to see the manager to tell him I could only get to town on Saturday. The shops have a few pairs of shoes and sell them; then close.

My daughter has just won a scholarship and is doing medicine at Liverpool University. If we have a house with an empty room we are obliged to have a lodger. I have had one or two people in my house throughout the war, and it is only yesterday that a student left me and I am quite alone. I am sure it will not be for long, but it is so nice to be alone.

This little picture of my life is the same for everybody, and we are not unhappy about it for the end is now peace as far as fighting is concerned. I do hope things will settle down in the world and be peaceful. Please accept our very best wishes for Christmas and the New Year. We are so grateful to you all for your kind thoughts and for the lovely parcels. Thank you all so much.

How to make holiday baking easy
Time to start thinking about all those good things you can bake now and keep for holiday eating. And here are recipes for an Apple Sauce Fruit Cake and some delightful cookies... examples of how easy it is to turn those thoughts into delicious things to eat. No need to worry for they keep perfectly.

APPLE SAUCE FRUIT CAKE
An easy-to-make cake that will store for a number of weeks if kept in a cool, dry place.
2 cups flour 1 egg
1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup unsweetened sieved
2 tsp. soda 1 cup applesauce
1 cup baking powder 1 cup sliced
1 tsp. cinnamon 1 cup seedless
1/2 tsp. nutmeg 1/2 cup seedless
1/2 tsp. cloves raisins
1 tsp. allspice 1/2 cup chopped
1 cup shortening nutsmeats
1 cup brown sugar firmly packed

Sift and measure flour; sift again with salt and spices. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy; beat in eggs. Add applesauce and flour mixture alternately; beat until smooth. Add fruit and nutsmeats. Pour into well-greased loaf pan (9x5x3) and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 1 hour or until done. Makes one loaf cake.

GINGERSNAPS
1/2 cup shortening 2 1/2 cups flour
1 cup sugar 1 tsp. cinnamon
1 egg, beaten 2 tps. ginger
1 tsp. soda 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup dark molasses

Cream shortening and sugar together until light and fluffy; add egg. Stir in combined soda and molasses. Sift and measure flour; sift again with cinnamon, ginger and salt. Blend well into creamed mixture. Chill about 1 hour. Shape dough into small balls between palms of hands. Place balls on lightly-greased cookie sheet about 1 1/2 to 2 inches apart. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 15 to 18 minutes, or until done. Remove to rack and cool. Makes 5 to 6 dozen cookies.
