

Market Meeting At OSC To Draw Well Known Men

With the program virtually completed for the state-wide marketing conference at Oregon State college, a three-day session, January 16 to 18, has been announced instead of the tentative five-day conference previously considered. The conference is expected to draw approximately 300 agricultural, industrial and financial leaders of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest to consider the general theme of "Dynamic Factors Affecting Agricultural Economy."

In a statement concerning the conference, President A. L. Strand called attention to the fact that Oregon agriculture suffered a severe set back after World War I when the country was taken unaware by the powerful economic and social forces loosed by modern warfare. After the economic collapse of 1921, which hit agriculture the hardest, the state college sponsored its first economic conference in 1924 which has helped to guide the state's agricultural economy since that time.

The first day of the conference will be devoted to the general subject, "Basic Forces in Our Economy." Among the speakers will be Paul J. Raver, administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration; Dr. Marion Clawson, regional agricultural analyst of the B. A. E.; T. S. Carswell, western representative of the Monsanto Chemical Company, Seattle; J. Prescott Blount, representing United Airlines, Chicago; and S. Eugene Allen, editor of the Oregon Labor Press, Portland.

General subject for the second day will be "An Appraisal of Markets and Market Conditions." Some of the speakers to be heard that day will be A. Rex Johnson, from the office of foreign agricultural relations in Washington, D. C.; Oliver P. Wheeler, from the San Francisco Federal Reserve bank; Dr. Blair Stewart, professor of economics, Reed College; Dr. Sherman E. Johnson, chief in farm management, Washington, D. C.; and Dr. C. E. Maser, head of the division of business and industry, O. S. C.

The final day will be devoted to the subject, "Adjusting Our Economy to Meet New Problems." Among those to be heard that day will be E. B. McNaughton, president of the First National Bank, Portland; J. O. Crawford, vice-president, National Food Brokers association, Los Angeles; Jesse W. Tapp, former assistant administrator of the A. A. A.; A. E. Clark, Portland attorney; Dean William A. Schoenfeld, Dr. D. B. DeLoach and E. L. Potter of the O. S. C. agricultural staff.
