Red Cross Group Relates Projects

Servicemen continue to arrive in large numbers in Pacific coast ports, and those requiring hospitalization are placed in nearby hospitals where Red Cross supplies supplement those of the army and navy; so volunteers of the local Red Cross production corps will continue to make garments to meet demands of west coast hospitalized veterans, civilian relief needs abroad and local emergency reserves, according to Mrs. McGeorge.

The Coquille Red Cross unit made one comforter last week for a needy family in the county, and obtained a kit containing a baby layette for a Coos county family, stated Mrs. F. C. True, local production chairman, who went on to say that a meeting of the group will be held Friday, January 25, in the parish house, from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m., and all ladies interested are invited to attend.
