\$2,586,152 Paid Oregon Unemployed

Oregon's unemployed received \$2,586,152 in January, nearly a million dollars more than in December and more than double any previous month in the history of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, Chairman T. Morris Dunne announced today.

State checks totalling \$1,859,802 went to laid-off war workers and other covered employees, while \$726,350 was paid in readjustment allowances to discharged veterans under the G-I Bill of Rights. By agreement with the Veterans Administration these \$20-weekly payments are made by the state commission to returning service men and women.

Veterans' allowances increased nearly 57 per cent over December, while state payments went up 53 per cent. While future increases in G-I checks are expected, a leveling
