The sum of \$4,997.19 was accepted by the city council meeting in session Monday evening in the council chambers from the Oregon State highway department as the state's share to the city of Coquille for work on roads and streets in the city limits. The money may be held for a period of two years to be spent, or before the end of that time, may be placed in a special trust reserve fund by going through a technical method to set up a reserve fund.

### County To Hold School Meetings For Board Members

Meetings of school board members of the county are to be held in North Bend, Myrtle Point and Bandon on March 20, 21, and 22, it was announced on Wednesday by Mrs. Martha Mulkey Purdy, county school superintendent. School clerks and other school board members interested will have opportunity at these meetings to get the latest information on school law from Lester Wilcox, assistant state superintendent of public instruction from Salem.

Legal points relating to the retirement law and the rural school district law will be emphasized. Discussion will be held, also, on problems of budgets made up annually in the spring.

Mr. Al Montgomery of Coquille will speak on items related to the recent audit of school records.

The North Bend meeting on March 20th, Wednesday, will be at the City Hall, from 10:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m., with no definite plans as yet for luncheon arrangements.

At Myrtle Point, the Thursday, March 21, meetings will be held in the Union high school from 10:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. and lunches will be available at the school cafeteria.

Bandon's meeting will be held in the grammar school on Friday, March 22nd, from 10:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. and there will be provisions for the purchase of luncheons through the school.

Mrs. Purdy states that the school boards of the county will probably resume their pre-war practice of a county meeting this coming fall. At this annual assembly, problems of a general nature are considered for the welfare of the schools of the county.

### Conservation Needs Will Be Studied

An inventory of agriculture conservation needs on all Coos county farms and ranches at five community meetings, is being held this week and next, under the direction of community committeemen, according to J. D. Carl, chairman of the County AAA committee.

When the survey is concluded in every community, the report will show the kind and extent of conservation practices needed to maintain fertility and prevent erosion. These reports will have an important bearing on the amount of money which will be available during 1946 for use in the conservation program in this county, Carl stated.

Practices which have been used most during past years and which are likely to be most needed in the future to protect our soil resources include the application of agriculture lime, the use of phosphate fertilizer, drainage ditch construction, pasture improvement, and seeding perennial grasses and legumes.

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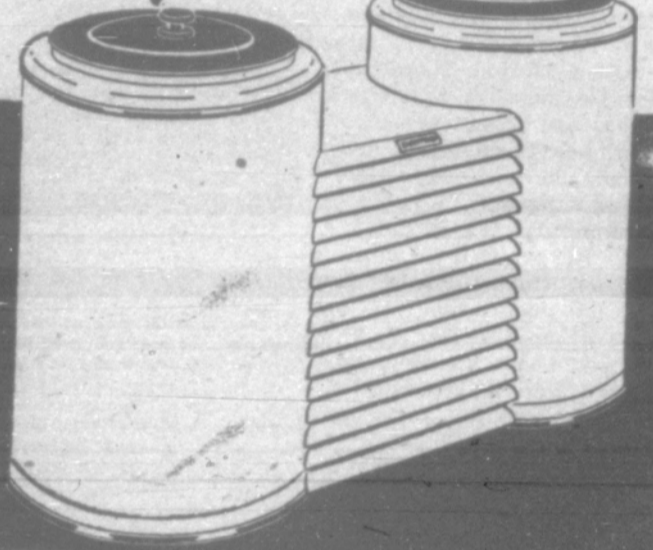
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### THE OLD JUDGE SAYS...
