During September, 1945, powers of attorney filed were as follows, V.F.W., 46,020; American Red Cross, 25,142; American Legion, 18,661; Disabled American Veterans, 2,264, and others, 3,382.

The veteran is free to choose the agency to which he grants power of attorney.
