

### New Bus Company Would Start Line Along Oregon Coast

Three officials of the All-American Bus Lines, Inc., were in Coquille Friday and Saturday after investigating possibilities of running a bus line of their company through Coquille on through San Diego to Portland service runs.

Guernsey Frazer, All-American's Pacific coast public relations counsel, Clarence Phillips, the company's Oregon legal counsel and N. C. Knapp, California representative, inspected the region and talked to civic leaders regarding the area's potential in bus transportation.

All-American is now running the latest type buses on an elaborate transcontinental service including New York, Chicago, Washington, D. C., Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Tulsa, Dallas, Phoenix, Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Diego and between points.

The officials declared that the Pacific coastline route is one of the few major areas in the nation where only one bus line is operating. They hope to receive permission from the interstate commerce commission to start competitive service on the San Diego to Portland coastline run, using highway 101 through Oregon. This would connect directly north and south with their transcontinental service.

Tentative planning would add three north and three south-bound schedules to the present bus schedules of Greyhound Lines. Terminal facilities in this area would include Florence, Reedsport, North Bend, Coos Bay, Coquille, Bandon, Langlois, Port Orford and Gold Beach.

Several pieces of land on which myrtle groves predominate have been signed up for preservation recently, according to Otis Jensen, superintendent of the state park's commission myrtlewood project here.

Signers include Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Jacobsen, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McCloskey, Judge and Mrs. Dal M. King and Mr. and Mrs. Fred B. Hickok.

The lease will allow the state to clean up underbrush and otherwise beautify the land containing myrtle trees. The land and its use is fully retained by the owner, with the state being interested only in the preservation of the myrtle groves.

**Many Traffic Deaths**  
Preliminary reports showed Oregon traffic fatalities for February, 1946, skyrocketed to a total of 31 deaths tying the highest recorded February death toll in Oregon history, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., said today.

The death toll, averaging more than 1 each day of the month, is attributed to inclement weather conditions, slippery road surfaces and speed too great for existing conditions.

### Stronger Silos Are Needed For Grass, Legume Use

Increasing popularity of grass and legume silage throughout western Oregon prompts M. G. Huber, extension agricultural engineer at O. S. C., to give a few suggestions and precautions regarding building new silos or preparing old ones for such use.

Grass and legume silage exerts pressures up to twice as much as ordinary corn silage, Huber explains, although most of the manufactured silos have ample strength whether they be made of wood, brick tuff, concrete, metal or the new glass lined types. For home built silos, close checking of steel reinforcing according to size of silo is advised.

Old silos built for corn may need additional reinforcing before being filled with grass or legume silage, Huber adds. This applies particularly to wooden hoop silos which, where exposed to the weather, have been known to fail after nine or 10 years use. Those may be reinforced with steel hoops.

### Civil Service Exms Slated

The United States Civil Service Commission announces examinations for the positions of Stenographer and Typist. These are the first of the examinations to be announced since the recent Executive Order directing the Civil Service Commission to return to the practice of holding examinations leading to permanent appointment in the federal service.

Applications must be on file with the Director, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service Region, 457 Central Building, Seattle 4, Washington, not later than March 26, 1946. Full information may be obtained from C. Vernon Smith, at local postoffice.

### Veterans Advised On Job Training

How the Oregon veteran can establish himself in on-the-job training under the GI bill of rights is explained in a bulletin prepared and released this week by Hugh E. Rosson, Department of Veterans' Affairs director.

The four-page bulletin sets forth simply the steps the veteran must take in order to receive the training subsistence allowances granted him during his period of learning in an occupation, to augment his salary.

It warns, however, that "government funds provided under this program are not intended as a dole for the veteran nor as a means whereby the employer gets cheap labor at government expense. These funds are intended to train the veteran for his own future security as well as to provide industry with skilled men."

**Certify Paper Early**  
The Veteran is advised to certify his eligibility for job-training with the Veterans Administration as early as possible to avoid delays in drawing his allowances once he has obtained a job under the program. His next step, after getting a job, is to contact his local apprentice coordinator to arrange a training schedule and related studies pertaining to his job, the bulletin says.

Oregon's 24 coordinators covering the state are listed in the bulletin, which is being mailed to county service officers, all veterans' organizations, and local selective service boards. Copies are available at the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library building, Salem.

Officials of the state department of vocational education and of the state apprenticeship council, which cooperate in setting up and supervising the job-training program, assisted in preparing the bulletin.
