

## Army Officer Gets Service Discharge

Lt. Col. Harry R. Turkel received his honorable discharge at Santa Ana, California, Army Air Base on January 31st after 43 months of overseas service.

The Turkel family is well known in Coquille. Mrs. Turkel is the former Margaret Stauff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stauff. Mrs. Turkel and two children lived in Coquille for a year and a half while Mr. Turkel was in Europe.

From July of 1942 to November of 1943, Lt. Col. Turkel was in Africa where he was Chief of Intelligence for Africa and the Middle East Air Transport Command prior to the invasion of Africa.

From the winter of 1943 to the summer of 1945 he was in Europe as Chief, Signal Intelligence of the 9th Air Force, based on the continent from the invasion of Normandy to the close of the hostilities. Here he received the Legion of Merit.

Before entering the service, Mr. Turkel was Senior Divisional Assistant in the State Department in Washington, D. C., and has now accepted a position as Assistant Chief, State Department, Division of Commercial Policy.

After his return from Europe, Mr. Turkel visited in Coquille and took his family to their new home at 3046 P. St., N. W., in Washington, D. C.

## Oregon Citizens Asked To Save Food

Oregon citizens will be asked to eat less of some foods, prevent waste and endure a few shortages to make more wheat and food fats and oils available to save lives in famine-ridden countries.

The voluntary support of every man, woman and child in the state will be sought in a comprehensive program being initiated by county USDA councils. E. Harvey Miller, state director of the USDA Production and Marketing administration and chairman of the Oregon USDA council, has announced. Miller and county AAA committee chairmen have been named by Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson as state and county emergency food program managers.

Voluntary food-for-famine-relief committees, made up of representatives of all groups who can help in the program, are proposed for each county in plans adopted by the Oregon USDA council and sent to each county emergency food program manager.

### Goals For Each County

Food conservation goals will be set up for each county. Subcommittees representing consumers and trade groups, such as restaurants and bakeries, will be formed to put into effect specific food conservation measures. As proposed by the national

A sub-committee of the state USDA council in active charge of organization of the statewide effort consists of C. R. Tulley, assistant director of the FMA field services branch, Portland, chairman; Ralph Morgan, state supervisor vocational agriculture, Salem; W. L. Teutsch, assistant director O.S.C. Extension service, Corvallis, and John Denny, fieldman PMA, Corvallis.
