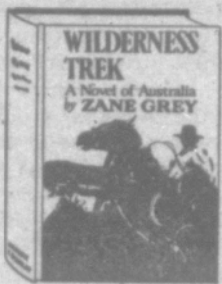
Mrs. Thelma Snyder Entertains Club
