African Missionary At Christian Church

From April 28th to May 12th the Christian church is offering a unique series of services. Dr. E. R. Moon, a retired missionary to the Belgian Congo, will lead the services. During the first week Dr. Moon will tell of the country and some of his experiences during the 15 years he was there. The second week he will preach evangelistic sermons.

Dr. Moon went to the Congo from Oregon in 1908. Together with Bob Wilson he reconstructed the mission steamer Oregon above the rapids on the Congo river. He served as captain of the Oregon for seven years until he had properly trained a native captain and engineers. During this time he made the first navigation chart of the Bussira-Juapa river, a tributary of the Congo, for 500 miles. This chart is still used by river steamers.

During his last term in the Congo, along with Miss Goldie Wells and Mrs. Moon, he opened up the Mondombe Mission Station which is still the farthest inland station of the Disciples of Christ mission. Dr. Moon translated the Gospel of Mark into the Ladia language, which was the

first translation of any of the Bible into the language of the high Juapa river country. Dr. Moon is a Fellow of the Royal British Geographical Society.

Dr. Moon has taught five years in the College of Missions of the Disciples of Christ, and has served as professor of Missions at Butler university. In 1938 he went to Jamaica and spent six years there in mission work.

The music during these services will be in charge of Ivan Correl, the pastor of the North Bend Christian church. Mr. Correl is known as an outstanding song leader, having led the music at the last two state Christian Endeavor conventions. The services will begin each evening at 7:45. Monday is rest night.
