How to prepare old-time meat favorites

SWISS STEAK

Allowing about 1 1/2 pound for each person, have steak cut 1 to 2 inches thick. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Pound with edge of plate. Brown in melted shortening in Dutch oven or heavy frying pan. Add 2 cups of water, cover, and cook slowly for 2 1/4 hours or until meat is tender. Add more water, if necessary, to make the desired amount of gravy. Serve with fluffy mashed potatoes.

LAMB SHOULDER POT ROAST

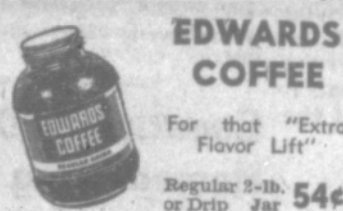
Sprinkle a 3-pound lamb shoulder with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Brown in melted shortening in a Dutch oven or deep kettle with tight fitting lid. Add 2 cups of hot water, a medium-size onion thinly sliced and a bay leaf. Cover and cook slowly about 3 hours or until tender. Add more water if necessary. Serves 6 to 8.

BRAISED SHORT RIBS

Have 3 pounds of short ribs cut in serving size pieces. Brown slowly, turning often, in a small amount of shortening in a heavy kettle with tight fitting cover. Add a cup of hot water, salt and pepper. Cover and cook slowly until meat is tender, about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Serve the liquid as gravy or add more water and thicken with flour blended to a smooth paste with cold water. Serves 6.
