Mrs. Tom Counts has resigned her position as physical education instructor at the high school, it was announced this week. No successor has been found for her position.

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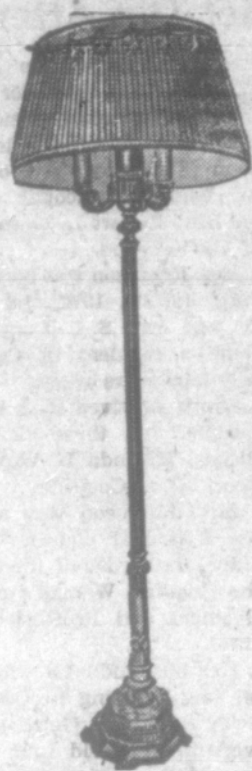
