C. A. (Sunny) Sundberg Springfield, Ohio, foremost Eagle humorist and philosopher, will speak in Coquille May 31st before members of Coquille Aerie at the Eagle Hall. The program will start at 8:00 p. m.

A former college president and nationally known lecturer, Sundberg is noted for his sparkling wit and espousal of brotherhood and fraternalism. He has addressed hundreds of civic clubs, commencement exercises and other programs.

Sundberg debated in public with the late Clarence Darrow, the late Judge Ben Lindsay, famous juvenile jurist, and has spoken from the same

platform with Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio and other national figures. A graduate of Carthage and Wittenberg colleges, Sundberg was president of Thiel college, Greenville, Pa., from 1922 to 1925.

He was a noted college athlete and at Carthage college registered 41 points at a track meet for a record which still stands.

Sundberg, who will arrive in Coquille on Friday, May 31, will be welcomed by Coquille Eagle officers.

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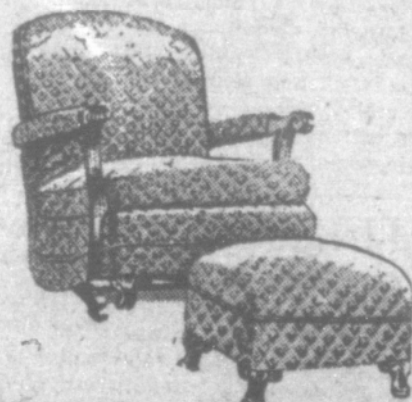
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
