

New Hospital of Dr. Gerald Stark Found Most Modern and Attractive

Patients' Welfare Considered When Building Planned

Planned for the welfare of the patient and the most efficient care for him is the new hospital opened here this week by Dr. Gerald Stark on Hall street next to the Roxy theatre.

Appointments for diagnosis and treatment are of the latest type, and the walls, ceilings and floors are of sound-proof material which adds to the restful quiet.

Two Consultation Rooms

Downstairs are two consultation and examining rooms, a room for basal metabolism tests and electrocardiograms, a room suitable for use with isolation cases, a light, well-planned laboratory which contains an autoclave for surgical sterilizing. Nearby is the x-ray room containing a new Keleket x-ray machine completely equipped for taking films and doing fluoroscopic examinations. The adjoining dark room is completely equipped down to the last trick metal number to put on a metal marker to identify each picture taken.

A treatment room is especially equipped for eye, ear, nose and throat cases. One room which can be entirely darkened is for eye and sinus examinations. One small room is arranged for diathermy treatment and another close by for ultra violet treatments.

The first young lady to cuddle under the blue and pink blankets of the glassed-in nursery upstairs in the hospital is Miss Nancy Vandenburg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond L. Vandenburg. The baby was born at 11:30 p. m. on Tuesday evening and weighed 6½ pounds.

A large airy men's ward, several rooms with two to three comfortable beds, a complete surgery, the nursery and a compact kitchen are upstairs.

The kitchen has new spacious electric appliances and is well planned for preparing meals easily.
