Myrtle Point and Bandon won first and second places, respectively, in the Division IV for state traffic safety records, it was announced this week by the secretary of state's office.

Other cities winning in the state were:

Division I (10,000 and over) Eugene, first; Bend, second; and Astoria, third.

Division II (5,000-10,000) Grants Pass, first; La Grande, second; Albany, third.

Division III (2,000-5,000) Tillamook, first; Dallas, second; Redmond, third.

Division IV (1,000-2,000) Myrtle Point, first; Bandon, second; Nyssa, third.
