

Weekly Letter From Washington, D. C.

Session Nears End

There is still considerable "must" legislation to be completed by Congress before the end of the fiscal year, June 30th. All current appropriations end on that date. The draft law ends and so does the OPA law. Both of these laws will be extended, but there is considerable work to be done to adjust the differences between the two houses of Congress.

As this is written, the Senate is working on the draft extension bill and will then take up OPA. Several appropriation bills have yet to be acted upon. So, in spite of the fact that the leadership in both House and Senate have been driving to get this legislation completed as early as possible, we are drawing near the deadline date.

The House has been somewhat ahead of the Senate in clearing its major bills. During the last two weeks, the Senate has been endeavoring to catch up by holding numerous night sessions. After the necessary legislation is completed, and by "necessary" I mean those bills which must be acted upon before the end of the fiscal year, there does not seem to be enough other pending legislation to require the Congress to stay in session very late into the summer. No one is willing to predict when this session will end, but the general opinion seems to be that the date will be somewhere around July 15th—probably a little later.

Congress Honors Deceased Members
The annual Memorial Service was held in the House of Representatives on May 28th. This service is held each year to eulogize and revere the deceased members of the Senate and House who have passed away during the year. As a rule, the Senate does not officially join this memorial service, but the Senators usually take time off to attend. This year was a bit different, inasmuch as Senator Carter Glass had passed away that morning, and the Senate had adjourned its daily session in respect to this veteran Senator. The Senate recessed at 11:21 a. m. and most of

the members came to the House chamber to attend the prepared program.

Four Senators have passed away (including Senator Glass) during the past year, and four Representatives, including Oregon's James W. Mott. This is an unusually large number in the Senate, and a small number in the House. The Senate has 86 members, and the House 435, and in one year, not so long ago, there were 28 members of the House who passed away.

Music for the service was furnished by the U. S. Army Band orchestra and solos by Congressman Louis Rabaut of Michigan, accompanied by his daughter at the piano. Invocation and scripture readings were made by the House Chaplain, Dr. James Shera Montgomery, who opens every session of the House with an impressive prayer. The addresses of eulogy were delivered by Hon. F. Edward Hebert (D) of Louisiana and Hon. J. Harry McGregor (R) of Ohio.

Congressman Edith Nourse Rogers placed a memorial rose in a vase in front of the Speaker's platform as the name of each deceased member was read by the clerk. This was followed by a one-minute period of devotional silence.
