

Siskiyou Fire School Held

Under the direction of Rex Wilson of the supervisor's staff, the Siskiyou National Forest has just completed its annual forest guard training school where all phases of fire control work are taught to the new men and the experienced guards are brought up-to-date.

Held again this year at Rand Ranger Station June 18, 19, and 20, the six districts were well represented by fifty-five men scheduled to become lookouts, firemen, and fire prevention guards. Classes in fire detection or lookout work were held each day at Peavine Lookout tower, while the remainder of the classes were held at or near the ranger station on the Rogue River about twenty miles below Grants Pass. Map reading, telephone and radio operation, compass reading, pacing, fire line construction, dispatching, smokechasing, large fire organization and scouting were taught with the aid of field problems near the camp.

It wasn't all work, however, for in the evenings there was horse shoe pitching, volleyball and softball. It is rumored also that some poker sessions took place, and there were a few hardy souls who went swimming in the Rogue River.

Highlights of this year's school were the electric storm of the afternoon and evening of June 20 and the fire which occurred the same day. The electric storm set several fires, one of which was on the Rags Creek district whose headquarters is Redwood Ranger Station out of Cave Junction. Men were dispatched to the fire immediately from the blaster control crew and could be seen near the fire, finding their way by flashlight that same night. Just before the afternoon classes began that same day, a fire of undetermined origin on Taylor Creek. The small fire class under Instructor Stickney and the dispatchers class under Instructor Morey went with Ralph King, fire prevention guard. Upon their arrival at the fire they found a dwelling had burned down, resulting in a grass fire which had spread dangerously fast to adjoining house and the surrounding woods. In spite of the fitful gusts of wind which caused the loss of some sections of the hastily made fire line, the fire was promptly controlled and the second house saved. Mr. Edward Baldwin, whose house burned, sustained severe burns on his arms, neck and face and was taken immediately to Grants Pass for medical attention.

Lumber Company Applies For Permit

Application has been made to the War Department by the Coos Bay Lumber Company, Coquille, Oregon, for a permit to drive piling in Coquille River approximately one mile downstream (west) from Coquille, Oregon. The proposed work will be located in section 2, township 28 south, range 13 west of Willamette Meridian. Two rows of piles, which will be driven on the right (north) side of the channel, will extend from the Cedar Point log dump upstream a distance of 1820 feet. The outer row will be not more than 70 feet channelward from the low water line. Along the south bank opposite the two rows, a few piles are to be driven 10 feet channel ward from the low water line.

West Point Exams Slated July 24

Congressman Harris Ellsworth announced today that preliminary qualifying examinations for vacancies at both the United States Naval Academy, and the United States Military Academy, will be conducted by the United States Civil Service Commission July 24th at the Postoffice Buildings in Albany, Coos Bay, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford and Roseburg. Candidates desiring to compete should notify Congressman Harris Ellsworth, House Office Building, Washington, D. C., not later than July 10th. They should indicate their choice of the place for examination and give their date of birth.

Conklin To Head Fire Prevention

Governor Earl Snell this week notified Mrs. Stella Cutlip, Coos County Chairman that Mr. Robert P. Conklin of North Bend had been selected at the recent meeting of the Willamette Valley Logging Conference to give all possible aid to his Keep Oregon Green Committee during the dry summer months ahead.

The naming of Mr. Conklin as a representative of the logging industry means closer cooperation from the loggers of this section, the county chairman pointed out, as he is a logger and was named by Allen C. Smith, retiring president of the Conference to represent the loggers of Coos County in fire prevention work.

At the annual session of this group at Eugene in May the loggers urged their membership to give wholehearted support to Keep Oregon Green, and asked Governor Snell to name a logger in each of the eighteen Western Oregon counties to work with the local KOG committees and whose job would be to get the logging industry organized to reduce the number of man-caused forest fires. The logging Conference made the nominations to the Governor.

Tortoise Shell Bug Now Here

Worms which have been observed in large numbers in several sections in the eastern part of Coos county have been identified as the California Tortoise shell, according to a report received at the County Agents office this week.

This insect which feeds largely on wild lilac, manzanita and occasionally on other shrubs and fruit trees is not likely to cause serious damage in the opinion of the entomologist since they are not feeding on plants of economic importance in this area and since they soon change form and become inactive.
