Coquille was host Wednesday afternoon to a group of the senior class of the Munford high school of Munford, Tennessee. Munford is approximately thirty miles north of Memphis. This trip is the seventh undertaken by the school. They were started in 1935 but were discontinued during the war.

According to Mr. Willis, principal, 28 seniors and faculty members are making the present trip. Humbert also took first place in a boom stick race, clocking a round trip down and back along three long floating boom sticks in 24 seconds. Hancock was second in 27 1/2 seconds. Randleman made the trip in 30 seconds for third. Several other contestants landed in the river.

A free-for-all match aboard a barge in mid-river was won by Don Emerick, Coquille, the last man to remain aboard after a mad scramble of wrestling, pulling and pushing that kept the crowd laughing. Bud Hickam and Maury Williams were the last to leave the barge, being pushed in by Emerick when they forgot him and engaged in a private wrestling match. Hancock was winner of a "pond lily" race, in which contestants had to paddle large cross-sections of logs

from the shore to a barge. Bible was second and Dick Martindale, Coquille, was third.

The crowd was given an exhibition of the high-climbing when Bob McCarthy, newly returned from service as a B-29 tail gunner, topped a section of a large tree specially mounted on the river bank by Chairman T. L. Clinton for the sports show. McCarthy did a neat job in rapid time and was given a big "hand."
