Coquille then went to bat and Buzzy Oerding tied the score with an earned run. The bases were loaded by a bunt from Darrel Crossler.

Oakland changed pitchers after one third of the inning was over and the new pitcher, Talford, struck out the next two batters leaving the bases loaded.

Oakland made two runs the second inning with Bob Macdonald walking one man in. C. Knight hit a single and stole second when Talford balked a pitch. Bob Dykes hit a single to center field, Buzzy Oerding then hit a single through shortstop and C. Knight came in for another run. Johnson struck out. Bob Macdonald stole second and the second baseman missed the ball with Macdonald coming in home for another run. Oakland's catcher then switched with the shortstop. Bob Oerding then struck out.

Oakland's first batter hit a fly at the beginning of the third inning and it was caught by Buzzy Oerding. Talford then hit a single to the shortstop but was out on first. Scofield hit a single to the left fielder. The first home run was hit by B. Rice and made two runs for Oakland. The next hit was a fielders choice and the man was thrown out on second.

Coquille then went to bat with the score at Oakland 5, Coquille 4. Crossler and Kay both got hits but no runs were made.

Oakland made three more runs in the fourth inning with Bob Macdonald walking in one man.

Coquille made no runs with Bob Oerding getting the only hit.

Baird made the first hit of the fifth inning and made first base on an error by the shortstop. Blueard bunted and was thrown out on first. Redding hit to Macdonald and was thrown out at first.

Coquille went to bat making three outs in succession and only one hit by Crossler.

At the sixth inning the score was 8 to 4, Oakland in the lead. With the bases loaded, Macdonald, the pitcher, hit the batter with the ball and walked one run in. Baird then hit a fly to second base and Coquille made a double out on the play.

Coquille made substitution in the last half of the sixth inning. Jess Barton, manager, putting little Joe Macdonald in for Buzzy Oerding. Joe was walked to first. Johnson was walked. With two men on bases, Bob Macdonald hit a fielders choice down the third base line and Joe slid in home and the spectators went wild. Bob Oerding then hit a fly caught by the left fielder.

The first two men up to bat for Oakland in the last inning were out. Redding hit a home run through the left field fence. Talford hit a high fly to center field and the crowd held their breath as little Joe Macdonald, the local team's mascot caught it.

Coquille then went to bat and the first three batters struck out leaving the score at Oakland 10, Coquille 5.

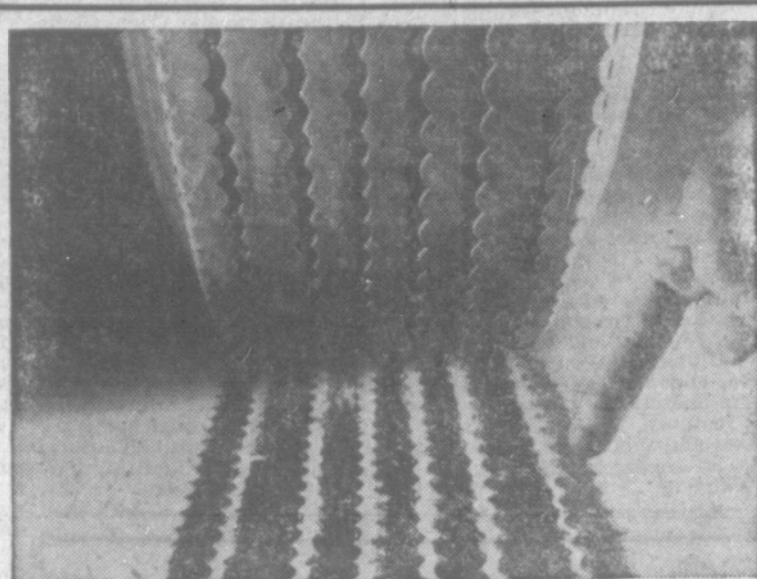
