

Bandon Defeats Coquille Nine

Coquille took a tromping by the Bandon nine in a fast game Sunday before the largest crowd this season at the Baseball Park here. At the end of the game the score was Bandon 6, Coquille 2.

Bandon was first up to bat and managed to get two men on bases but made no runs. Coquille then went to bat with J. Schaer and Dee Krantz getting on bases but the inning ended with the score still 0-0.

Bandon came through their next turn at bat with two runs when Capps hit a triple. Coquille got three hits this time at bat with no one getting to the home plate.

Bandon started off now with a high fly to left fielder Mary Goodman, who made a beautiful catch for their first out. McEntee then caught a fly hit by Bradley for the second out. Three men were then walked to make the bases loaded when J. Schaer caught a fly hit by Capps for the last out. Coquille went to bat with the first three men up to the plate being out.

Goodwin was up to the plate first for Bandon and hit a high fly out to Marv Goodman who made another spectacular catch. With two men on bases, Baird got a hit and a man came in home to make the score, Bandon 3, Coquille 0. With Coquille at bat, Marv Goodman hit a double to center field and then stole to third base. The next three men were out and no runs made.

Bandon then managed to get two men on bases but no one coming in for a run. Meek and Getchell then struck out for Coquille and McEntee hit a fly caught by Bandon's first baseman.

Two men were on bases for Bandon when Bradley got a hit to center field and two more runs came in for Bandon. One man was left on base when Godard made the last out. Coquille then went to bat with the score standing at 5-0 in favor of Bandon. Goodman then hit a home run with Krantz on second making the only two runs for Coquille. Bandon then got three hits but no runs coming in.

The first three men up to bat for Coquille got hits but all were out, making no runs.

Bandon made four hits this time at bat but did not bring in any runs. Coquille made their hits their time at bat bringing in no runs.

Coquille walked four men bringing in another run for Bandon this time. Coquille came close to making another run in their last time at bat but the game ended with the score standing Bandon 6, Coquille 2.

The next game will be held this Sunday with Coquille playing the Cape Arago nine at the local Baseball Park.

Gorse Fire Stopped

A ten acre fire in the gorse in the Bandon area was caught in time by the Coos County Fire Patrol and put out, it was announced this week. The fire was started by a careless camper who built a fire against a log the opposite end of which extended into the gorse.

According to Keith Young, district warden, a number of other fires have been caught by the fire patrol, and he warns campers against careless fires.

Coos Electric's Line Work Nearly Ready For Irrigation Season

Electrification of Coos and Curry counties in the gigantic project of the Coos Electric Co-operative is going ahead well and first juice to start the irrigation system of lower Coos county's cranberry bogs will soon be turned on, states R. H. Connors, manager of the Coos Electric Co-operative.

Over 35 miles of poles have been set hooking up the new system. They stretch from the Norway sub-station to below Bandon in the Rosa Road area and the Bradley Lake area.

Wire has been strung over 20 miles at the present time and about three weeks of stringing remains. It is possible that the wire work may be completed in two weeks.

A total of 800 horsepower will be furnished for irrigation in the cranberry area with water being pumped from streams, wells, and sumps.

Cranberry farmers and others in the area to be served by the new power line hail the completion of this unit of the REA's work as a mark of progress that will mean much to the agricultural background and economy of the section. With better irrigation facilities more production can be expected they state.

The work has been done in record time. A bulldozer has been used to clear out the right-of-ways. Clearing is now underway in the 4-mile road area and it is expected that the right-of-way will be completed to Langlois by the middle of August.

All construction material is here now H. A. Cottengim, construction superintendent says, which includes poles, wire, and crossarms. Transformers are arriving as fast as they are needed. Only critical items at the present time are insulators which are hard to get. However, the co-op has a promise on most material and other co-ops in the state are helping the Coos Electric by lending them critical items.

At the present time payroll on the project here amounts to 40 men.

In the Brookings area where work is also going ahead the Coos Electric has 10 men at work.

The non high school board of Coos county passed a tax levy resolution for \$105,105,193.97. This covered the same levy as was provided by the budget committee on July 1st. However, there was this slight change in the Budget: The item of receipts from land sales and rentals was increased to \$30,550. However, the Tuition was increased to the extent of \$5,550. The reason for the increase in Tuition was that the Non High Board anticipated that there might be a larger return of students due to the new compulsory education law.
