

Lions' Directors Okeh Swimming Pool As Year's Project Wednesday

Taking up the project of securing a new swimming pool for the city of Coquille, the board of directors of the Coquille Lions club went on record Wednesday night at their regular directors' meeting at the home of Phil Albom to make this their annual project for civic and community betterment.

Present at the meeting were directors Lloyd Claver, Ray Buckles, Ray Detlefsen, Lev Craven, Bob Harbison, George Jenkins, Dr. J. D. Rankin, Phil Albom, Evan Albom, Lewis Wiltshire, Ernie James and President Stan Sherwood.

According to President Sherwood, the Lions have been studying the problem of securing a place for the children of the town to swim for some time, and he had requested that the problem be studied.

Study Started

Under the Community Betterment committee and the Civic Improvement committee, letters have been written to state and national offices on the possibility of building a modern swimming tank. The League of Oregon Cities and also towns operating municipal tanks have been contacted. Various members of the committee have taken and will take trips to the other towns with pools to study their construction, operation, and maintenance.

At the request of President Sherwood the two committees led by Dr. Rankin and Dave Biegger have been merged and will work for the rest of the year on the swimming pool project, with Dr. Rankin and Biegger serving as co-chairmen.

"The Lions' club is merely working as a starter of the swimming pool movement," President Sherwood said today, and letters are being written to all clubs and groups to take part in the project of securing a pool. We want everyone in, and we want it to be a project of everyone, too," he stated.
