Real pitching by both Larry O'Dell of Coos Bay and Wally Richardson of Coquille marked the game for the spectators. Added to this was the tight ball playing which showed real development in one season of Junior Legion ball.

On Saturday Coquille won the right to play Coos Bay Sunday by defeating a lethargic North Bend team by a score of 8 to 3. Bob Macdonald pitched the Saturday win.
