## McCrea, Donlevy and Tufts Co-Star in "The Virginian" Sunday at The Roxy

Paramount's Technicolor production, "The Virginian," starring three of Hollywood's most popular leading men—Joel McCrea, Brian Donlevy and Sonny Tufts—makes camp next Sunday at the Roxy Theatre. Appearing in support of the three stars are lovely Barbara Britton, remembered for her recent personal triumph in "Till We Meet Again," and Fay Bainter and Henry O'Neill, who have never failed to come through with outstanding performances. Miss Britton plays Molly, New England bred girl, about whom revolves the romantic action in the film.

Paramount is reported to have spared no expense in its Technicolor adaptation of "The Virginian," to reproduce on the screen the beautiful, natural backgrounds of the West and to re-create the sweep, spectacle and suspense contained in the much loved story.

"The Virginian" was produced by Paul Jones, directed by Stuart Gilmore. Credit for adapting the novel to the screen goes to Howard Estabrook.
