Pasteurizing Course Set For Nov. 7-8

State examinations, and in conjunction therewith a short course, for all operators of dairy pasteurization equipment in this area will be held in Coos Bay at the Coos Bay Mutual Creamery November 7 and 8, the state department of agriculture announces.

This is the last of a series of such examinations being held in the southern part of the state, and all operators are urged to attend by Kenneth E. Carl, assistant chief of the division of foods and dairies and who is arranging the session.

The pasteurizer operator's examinations, required before the state license authorized by the 1945 legislature will be granted, will be held all day Friday, November 8, starting at 8:30 a. m., and will consist of written and oral parts. Applicants will be checked later in their own plants for rating on practical ability. No

licenses will be granted until the third phase of the examination is completed.

The short training program in conjunction with the state tests will be held the afternoon of Thursday, November 7. This has been arranged under the supervision of Prof. Roy Stout of the dairy manufacturing department of Oregon State college. The short course will be of great value to those taking the examinations as the

subject matter to be covered in the exams will be under review.

Pasteurizer operators from Coos Bay, Reedsport, the Coquille valley, Florence and Roseburg are expected to attend.

Carl says also that any butter makers or cheesemakers who would like to take the state examinations for these licenses on November 8 may do so if application is made to the department in advance.
