## Suggestions Given For Holding Real Family or Community Thanksgiving Party

What could be more in keeping with the Thanksgiving spirit than to have a gathering of the family clan, the club or community group of your interest? Here are a few suggestions for making the Thanksgiving celebration a lively and interesting affair.

Invitations in the curious New England spelling might read:

Our harvest being gotten in Let us after special manner rejoice Together over the fruits of our labours

Four fowls have been killed for feasting, etc.

The room can be made to look woody with autumn leaves and corn shocks and pumpkins.

The fun must begin the moment the guests start arriving. Have ready-cut paper pumpkins, Pilgrim hats and name of some harvest product, grain, vegetable or flower. Pin one of these on the back of each person as he enters. This person must find out what he is by talking and mixing with others. When one has guessed

rightly he may pin his favor on his lapel.

By this time the guests will have arrived. Bring in four baskets of nuts. Have a grand march of "nut gatherers" to "Turkey in the Straw." With the group divided start a relay, carrying nuts with a tablespoon from one basket to an empty one. Head bands may be presented as prizes and for any achievement gained by anyone the award of a turkey feather for the head can add to its decoration.

"Turkey shooting" can be arranged with darts or bows and arrows and a paper turkey will be the target.

Divide Indian or Puritan names as Eagle-Bye, Hia-watha, Pris-cilla, Minne-hahah, John-Alden, and place one half for boys and men, and one half for girls, to be selected and matched for partners.

The "feast" can be a buffet luncheon arranged on a table decorated with garden vegetables, bowl of fruit or a pumpkin filled with fruit. For the feast prepare:

Puritan Stew (creamed chicken in patties); Golden Harvest Salad (molded carrot and pineapple on lettuce); Boston Tea (hot spiced tea or cider); Plymouth Rocks (brownie squares topped with whipped cream and a cherry).
