Piling Permit Asked By C.B.L.

Application has been made to the War department by the Coos Bay Lumber company, Coquille, Ore., for a permit to drive piling for a log boom in Coquille river approximately 1.2 miles downstream from Coquille, Oregon.

The location of the proposed work will be along the right (north) bank of Coquille river channelward of the Cedar Point log dump. It will consist of driving piling approximately 70 feet channelward from the low water line to connect with their existing installation above and below Cedar Point.

Maps showing the location and plan of the proposed work with reference to the existing piling may be seen at this office.

Objections from the standpoint of navigation should be received in the office of O. E. Walsh, Colonel, Corps of Engineers, by Nov. 26, 1946.

Umpqua River Closed

The main Umpqua river below its north and south forks is not open now to angling for trout of any size, anglers are warned by the state game commission. Trout ten inches and over in length may be angled for at this time of year only in that part of the North Umpqua river from its mouth to the narrows and in that part of the South Umpqua river from its mouth to the junction of Jackson creek, exclusive of their tributaries.

Steelhead and salmon 20 inches and more in length may be taken in the following waters at the present time. The main Umpqua river; those tributaries of the main Umpqua west of Highway 99; the North Umpqua river; and that part of the South Umpqua river below Jackson creek. Except those just mentioned, all other tributaries are closed to winter fishing.

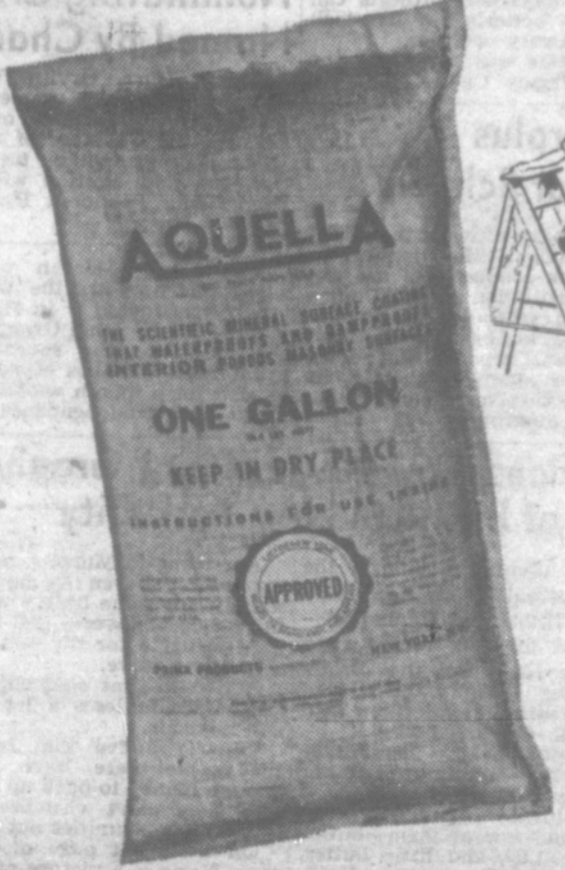
